



**CITY OF BEVERLY HILLS  
REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING  
MINUTES  
August 7, 2012**

The Regular City Council meeting was held in the Council Chambers at 7:00 pm.

**A. ROLL CALL**

**B. PRESENTATIONS**

**1. NEW BUSINESS RECOGNITION - Beverly Hills Brownie Company**

Mayor Brien, along with Councilmember Gold who is the Chair of the City's Small Business Task Force, presented a certificate of recognition to Bobbie Greenfield of the Beverly Hills Brownie Company and congratulated her on the recent opening of their flagship store in Beverly Hills.

Mayor Brien called for a minute of silence to honor the Israeli athletes and coaches who were massacred at the 1972 Munich Olympic Games.

3. REPORT FROM THE CITY MANAGER \* Electric Vehicle Charging Stations - Chad Lynn, Director of Parking Operations

Director of Parking Operations Chad Lynn presented a PowerPoint and spoke about the electric vehicle charging stations. He provided general information, showed a map of the local and regional stations, and spoke about interesting things to note such as charging vehicles, disabled access, connectivity activity, usage and occupancy.

Study Session Item 12 was taken up as directed by Council. Assistant City Attorney Lolly Enriquez reported that as a cost saving measure, the State has suspended certain provisions of the Brown Act, one of which is the noticing and posting of meeting agendas. The City has decided to continue to comply with all the provisions of the Brown Act despite the suspension in order to maintain transparency and open government.

4. CITY COUNCILMEMBER AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Vice Mayor Mirisch thanked the Mayor for leading the City in a minute of silence. He spoke about Raoul Wallenberg, a Swedish diplomat who saved Jews from Nazi persecution. He asked the Mayor to adjourn the meeting in honor of Mr. Wallenberg's memory, and also asked to have a future Study Session item to discuss a way to memorialize his actions and forever link him to the City. He read a letter from Charles Levy pledging a contribution of \$10,000 from the Marjorie Gilbert Trust to the City for a remembrance of Raoul Wallenberg's 100th birthday.

Mayor Brien noted a possible conflict between the September 11, 2012 City Council meeting and a memorial service being planned on the evening of September 11th. He directed the City Clerk to work with the City Manager to schedule the meeting around the event or to another date.

Mayor Brien reported on his Legislative Advocacy trip to Washington D.C. on July 30 - August 1, 2012 with City Manager Kolin and Police Chief Snowden. The trip aimed to raise awareness of and additional funding for a number of City programs and issues.

Comment: This item was continued from the July 24 meeting to August 7. Staff recommends that the public hearing related to this item be continued to September 11, 2012.

This being the time and place set, a public hearing was held to consider:

3. A. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BEVERLY HILLS AMENDING BEVERLY HILLS MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 10-8-106 REGARDING TROUSDALE VIEW RESTORATION PERMIT PROCEDURES. First Reading - For Introduction.

B. CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENTS TO BEVERLY HILLS MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 10-3-2616 REGARDING DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS FOR WALLS, FENCES AND HEDGES IN THE TROUSDALE ESTATES AREA OF THE CITY.

Comment: Consider amendments to the adopted ordinances regarding view restoration in Trousdale including the notice procedures for view restoration permit hearings and the definition of "hedge" for the purpose of regulating hedge heights.

The notice of the hearing was published as required by law and an affidavit to this effect is on file with the City Clerk.

The records and files of the Community Development Department and the report of the Principal Planner concerning this matter shall be entered into the record.

Principal Planner Michele McGrath presented the PowerPoint presentation and staff report. She noted the current program, outlined the amendment process, discussed the Trousdale fence and hedge ordinance, the Trousdale view restoration ordinance, and reviewed the proposed amendments.

Council discussed the following items: facial challenge, cap to the view owner's litigation cost, definition of "obscure," CC&Rs (covenants codes and restrictions), and the administrative penalty process which was explained by Code Enforcement Manager Nestor Otazu.

Mayor Brien polled the Councilmembers' responses to the following five questions:

1. Change the noticing requirement for the view restoration process from all owners within 500 feet to only those affected by case in question: 5 yes
2. Defining a hedge that is currently 3 or more plants/trees to 2 or more plants/trees: 5 yes
3. 3 strikes within 2 years requiring removal of the hedge: 5 yes
4. City will pay for defending a facial challenge to the ordinance and the view owner will pay for a challenge to a specific view restoration permit decision: 4 yes, Mirisch-no
5. City will pay for the administrative penalty process cost and the view owner will pay prosecution cost: 4 yes, Mirisch-no

The City Attorney will review the definition of "hedge" as redefined by staff and bring back to Council. Council directed that the hedge/obscure definition and setting a cap to the view owner's litigation cost be brought to the Ad Hoc Committee for discussion. Council agreed to introduce and read the ordinance by title only and re-notice the second part of the item pertaining to fence and hedge, and bring back to a meeting at a later date as a new Public Hearing item to discuss amendments which include clarifications to Items 2-5 above and the two items assigned to the Ad Hoc Committee.

***ITEM D-3: INTRODUCED AND READ BY TITLE ONLY; ADVANCE TO THE MEETING  
OF AUGUST 23, 2012 FOR ADOPTION***

This being the time and place set, a public hearing was held to consider:

4. A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BEVERLY HILLS AMENDING THE MASTER PLAN OF STREETS, ALLEYS AND HIGHWAYS AND ORDERING THE CONDITIONAL VACATION OF A PORTION OF AN ALLEY LOCATED ADJACENT TO THE PROPERTY AT 121 SPALDING DRIVE, AND APPROVING AN ENCROACHMENT PERMIT TO ALLOW CERTAIN ABOVE- AND BELOW-GRADE IMPROVEMENTS WITHIN THE ALLEY RIGHT-OF-WAY. Comment: The applicant for a new commercial building located at 121 Spalding Drive proposes to realign and widen an existing east-west alley. The existing alley is 15' wide, and would be shifted south by 1', and widened to 20' in width. Additionally, the applicant proposes a subterranean encroachment beneath the alley for parking purposes, and an above-grade encroachment over the alley to construct a bridge that would connect the top floor of 121 Spalding Drive to the top floor of 9800 Wilshire Boulevard.

The notice of the hearing was published as required by law and an affidavit to this effect is on file with the City Clerk.

The records and files of the Community Development Department and the report of the Senior Planner concerning this matter shall be entered into the record.

Senior Planner Ryan Gohlich presented a PowerPoint and staff report. He spoke about the alley modification, the alley encroachments, review by the Planning Commission, and staff recommendation.

Comment: This ordinance allows exercise clubs located outside the business triangle to request a CUP for the joint use of parking facilities to satisfy code requirements. Currently, only exercise clubs inside the business triangle may request a CUP for the joint use of parking facilities.

The notice of the hearing was published as required by law and an affidavit to this effect is on file with the City Clerk.

The records and files of the Community Development Department and the report of the Senior Planner concerning this matter shall be entered into the record.

Senior Planner Ryan Gohlich presented the PowerPoint and staff report. He discussed the zone text amendment, proposed zone text amendment language, showed a map of the Business Triangle showing the area under discussion, and staff recommendation.

Councilmember Bosse questioned the number of parking spaces, impact to residents and the CUP.

Vice Mayor Mirisch questioned the authority of PERS to impose the policy and expressed concern that it will set a precedent. He asked staff to determine who in PERS has requested the change in policy.

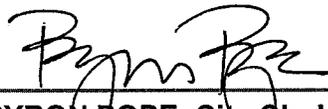
